Catastrophic Event Policy

A catastrophic event is defined as an unforeseen event, outside of the control of Remington College, which prevents the College, its faculty, staff, and students from proceeding with normal activities.

In the unlikely event of a catastrophe in which the College is no longer able to offer classes on campus or remotely due to a natural disaster, pandemic, or other unforeseen event, every effort will still be made to help students complete the outcomes for the current term.

The College's Emergency Preparedness Plan provides detailed emergency instructions for Remington students to ensure the safety and protection of property during fire, severe weather, loss of utilities, and other emergencies.

Remington leverages widely available educational technologies such as Learning Management System (LMS) and cloud-hosted collaboration.

The College will use flexibility in determining how to best provide for the continuation of coursework and services. The Provost and academic team will counsel students affected by the catastrophic event on completing their classes and/or degree program.

Remington will address program discontinuances on a case-by-case basis due to the specific needs of each program by campus. This allows Remington to better serve the needs of students by campus and program.

In the event that a program must be discontinued, the College will proceed according to its state and accrediting requirements. A teach-out plan will be submitted prior to its implementation. To the extent possible, students will not suffer financially as a result of the catastrophic event.
